

Yendegaia National Park Tompkins Douglas

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Yendegaia National Park is the result of public-private collaboration between the Government of Chile and the Yendegaia Foundation, a branch of the conservation project run by Douglas and Kris Tompkins. The park was first conceived in 2011 and was one of many projects created to celebrate the Bicentennial of Chile.

Douglas Tompkins is an American philanthropist, conservationist, organic farmer, and former businessman and has helped acquire and conserve more than 2 million acres of wild land. He lives in southern Chile and northern Argentina.

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Yendegaia means « Deep Bay » in the Yagan language. This park in Tierra del Fuego, declared a Biosphere Reserve, was formed thanks to the donation of more than 93,900 acres by the Yendegaia Foundation, led by Douglas and Kristine Tompkins, as well as the incorporation of more than 274,287 acres of parklands by the Chilean government.

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Along with her late husband Douglas Tompkins, the visionary behind these conservation projects who passed away in 2015, she is considered one of the most successful national park – oriented philanthropists in history. In 2017, she received the Carnegie Medal of Philanthropy.

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Kristine McDivitt Tompkins smiled broadly as she addressed hundreds of environmental activists, local residents and park employees at the entrance to the new national park. " I wish my husband Doug...

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Doug Tompkins reflected: " Yendegaia National Park is the result of a long-time team effort, and Kris and I are proud to have worked alongside a remarkable group of people, from visionary funders to dedicated Chilean conservationists. One of the original donors passed away some years ago, but I know he would be delighted today to hear the news.

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Puma í n Park received official nature sanctuary status in 2005 and was designated a national park in 2018, prompted by Tompkins Conservation ' s donation of almost 725,000 acres for the new, roughly 1-million-acre park, named in honor of its founder.

Thus the new Yendegaia National Park has helped establish one of the planet ' s most significant trans-boundary protected areas, or "peace parks".
